Happy New Year – Church Style

The new Church Year always begins with the season of Advent and on the 4th Sunday before Christmas Day. This year it's today, November 27, the earliest possible date for the season.

Advent is a season of eager anticipation and expectant waiting as we prepare ourselves for the coming of God in Jesus, the Christ. It is new, it is different.

The first thing you're likely to notice is a change in the liturgical color. The green of summer gives way now to a beautiful blue. You'll see it on the altar frontal and other hangings and on the stoles of the clergy wear.

Another thing you'll notice is some change in our services.

At 8:30am we shift to the Rite I Order for Holy Eucharist.

At 10:30am we continue with Rite II but shift to Eucharistic Prayer B. Prayer B has particularly appropriate language for this season of hope and anticipation. We will also experience some musical changes to enhance the season. Throughout the entire year our Gospel readings will primarily be from St. Matthew.

Another Advent tradition is the Advent Wreath. It is placed near the altar and has four candles, one to be lit on each of the four Sundays. It's another visual device to help us get ready to celebrate Jesus's coming.

I hope you are able to go deeper in Advent through St. Peter's.

The Celebrant and people sing the Kyrie eleison.

Celebrant or cantor: Lord have mercy. *People:* **Lord have mercy.**

The Collect of the Day

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

The Lessons

The people sit. After the lesson is read, the lector says, The Word of the Lord.

The people respond, **Thanks be to God.**

A Psalm is sung by one or more cantor(s), with the congregation singing the refrain.

Following the 2nd lesson the sequence hymn is: # 59

All standing, the Priest reads the Gospel, first saying, The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to _____.

The people respond, **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

After the Gospel, the Reader says, The Gospel of the Lord.

The people say, **Praise to you, Lord Christ.**

The Sermon

The Nicene Creed

The people stand.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty,

maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, by the power of the Holy Spirit,

For the aged and infirm, for the widowed and orphans, and for the sick and the suffering, including those whom we name at this time: _____,

People: Lord, have mercy.

For all who have died in the hope of the resurrection, including those whom we name at this time: _____, and for all the departed, let us pray to the Lord.
People: Lord, have mercy.

For deliverance from all danger, violence, oppression, and degradation,
let us pray to the Lord. *People: Lord, have mercy.*

That we may end our lives in faith and hope, without suffering and without reproach,
let us pray to the Lord. *People: Lord, have mercy.*

In the communion of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Blessed Peter, and all the saints, let us commend ourselves, and one another, and all our life, to Christ our God.
People: To thee, O Lord our God.

Almighty God, giver of every good gift: Look graciously on your Church, and so guide the minds of those who shall choose a rector for this parish, that we may receive a faithful pastor, who will care for your people and equip us for our ministries; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The celebrant prays the concluding collect for prayers of the people:

Heavenly Father, in the fullness of time you sent your beloved Son to reveal your dream of Beloved Community. Mercifully accept the prayers of your people, as we await with eager longing the return of our Savior and the glorious advent of your Kingdom on earth as it is in heaven. **Amen.**

The Confession and Absolution	<i>The people remain kneeling.</i>
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The priest bids the confession, saying: Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor:

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

Celebrant: Lift up your hearts.

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. *People:* **It is right to give God thanks and praise.**

The Celebrant gives thanks for the gifts of God, and the people respond with the hymn,

**Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.**

The people may continue to stand—or kneel—for the remainder of this prayer.
